

KEEPING THE LIGHTS ON.

In our rural location we are probably more aware of and affected by power cuts than our urban cousins. They enjoy a more secure supply of electricity, being fed by underground cables, compared to us country folk who receive our power via overhead lines. Why is this? I hear you ask. Well money is the simple answer. It is approximately 10 times more expensive to install cables underground than it is to string wires between poles and in rural areas we don't have convenient footpaths in front of our homes in which to lay these cables. So for sparsely populated rural areas it is far cheaper and convenient to use overhead lines to supply our power. We are not alone in this respect. Developed countries throughout the world use very similar philosophy and technologies to provide power to residents.

In the last few years a short section of the overhead lines in our valley have been removed and replaced with underground cable (Hopebeck to Miller Place). Why I hear you ask? Well this is something you can thank the "Friends of the Lake District" for. They complained for a long time that nothing was being done to remove the "unsightly" power lines from our countryside. The power company's response was that, since privatisation, all their budgets have been tightly controlled by the regulator and no expenditure was allowed for undergrounding of overhead lines. After lobbying the regulator for some time they eventually won the argument and now a small amount of funding is allowed each year to fund what are termed "Visual Amenity" works. The local power company (Electricity North West) asks the "Friends" each year where it would like this work to be carried out and, for reasons I am not aware of, they chose Lorton for the work a couple of years ago and this year similar work is taking place in the Darling How area (Whinlatter).

So, when the power does fail, usually during periods of severe weather, why do the lights go off and on several times before either staying on or staying off? Well, various sections of the network are protected by individual circuit breakers mounted on poles (similar to the circuit breakers you have in your fuse box at home) but they are a little more sophisticated. Many faults on overhead lines are caused by tree branches falling on to the power line before falling to the ground. The initial short circuit, caused as the tree branch falls, only lasts a few seconds, so the circuit breaker is programmed to switch off when it detects the short circuit but it then waits a few seconds before switching back on to see if the fault has disappeared. If it has then the lights stay on, if not it tries a couple more times but then decides the fault is permanent and the power stays off until the cause is fixed. This usually requires staff from ENW to attend site to locate and fix the fault before the power can be restored.

However, evidence of the excessive heavy rainfall over the last few months is everywhere. Many fields are still water logged, drains full, and road edges damaged by the torrents of water flowing off the fields after each downpour. Pot holes continue to be a problem throughout the valley. The council met on January 7th, and March 5th in the Yew Tree Hall. In addition a special planning meeting was held on Feb 26th. As always, we would welcome greater community participation in our meetings. 'People power' can be very effective, and when there are challenging planning issues in the area everyone has a voice and can contribute to the discussions. The Council may support or object to an application but the LNDPA do take into account individual responses so please come along and be aware of what is happening in your village.

Matters still under discussion include the possible moving of the Pound Wall, which is frequently damaged by vehicles negotiating the sharp bend at Boonbeck, (plans have been submitted to the LNDPA and approved subject to certain conditions) and the possible relocation of Lorton School Adventure Playground equipment to an area on the Parish Field.

The third annual Lorton School 10k road race is due to take place on March 22nd. This is a great event. Why not enter and enjoy the run up the valley, or come along to support the runners as they head into the finish at Parish Field. WI members have volunteered to help out with refreshments. They must be one of the longest running community groups in the village, as they are due to celebrate their 92nd birthday this March.....they welcome visitors, and new members, so just pop along to the meetings at the Yew Tree Hall on the second Tuesday of the month.

You may have seen the new Lorton Parish Council notice board, located near to the bus shelter in Low Lorton. The council would like to express its thanks to the Melbreak Communities for their contribution to the cost of this Notice Board, which we hope will withstand the weather better than the previous one. There is now a much larger space to display community notices so please do use it to promote your local events.

Now households in Lorton have been issued with purple recycling bags, for bottles, plastic and tins, the bottle bank should be used appropriately and not left overflowing by those who do not seem to see that it is already full.

Finally, a great place to catch up on local news, and have an excellent cup of coffee and slice of home-made cake, is the monthly Coffee Morning held at the Yew Tree Hall. Organised by the Melbreak Communities, the next one is Saturday March 15th, then April 12th. See you there!
